SUMMER SCHOOL 2010 (Revised)**

The following is a general announcement of which courses will be offered, the weeks involved, and the professors who will teach. Registration will take place in the spring semester. **The dress code for seminary students is business casual.**

First Session: May 18–28 (8:00–11:50 A.M.)

- 343 Advanced Issues in Pneumatology (2 hours), Mark A. Snoeberger, Ph.D.
Room 202
An investigation and analysis of select issues in contemporary pneumatology, including issues such as new covenant ministries of the Spirit, models of sanctification, miraculous gifts and prophecy, and communion with the Spirit..
- 535 Introduction to Biblical Counseling (2 hours), David M. Doran, D.Min.
Room 101
This course is intended to equip the student: (1) to make theologically informed evaluations of the major counseling theories and practices being advocated in the Christian community; (2) to identify an effective biblical paradigm for the counseling process; and (3) to deal with specific counseling situations and problems encountered in pastoral ministry.

Second Session: June 1–11 (8:00–11:50 A.M.)

- 119 Jonah and Nahum: English Bible (2 hours), Robert V. McCabe, Th.D.
Room 101
A study of the books of Jonah and Nahum. The intent of this course is to examine the introductory issues and develop the message of each book. Attention is also given to the theological content of each work.
- 445 History of Christian Doctrine (2 hours), Gerald L. Priest, Ph.D.
Room 202
The development of the major Christian doctrines throughout history is critically analyzed showing their effect upon the church and their contribution to present day theology.

Third Session: June 15–June 25 (8:00–11:50 A.M.)

- 204 Acts: English Bible (2 hours), William W. Combs, Th.D.
Room 101
An exposition of Acts covering the entire book. Emphasis will be given to the history and geography of the book through maps and photographs of the actual historical sites. Attention will also be given to important theological issues.
- 246 2 Peter & Jude: Greek Exegesis (2 hours), R. Bruce Compton, Th.D.
Room 202
This class involves translation, syntactical study, and other exegetical procedures. Attention is given to the theological issues in the books.
